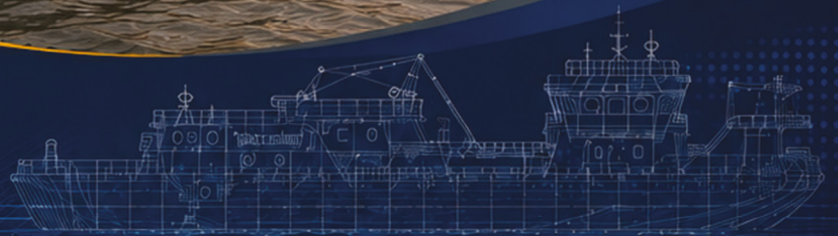

Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited (Hooghly-CSL), a wholly owned subsidiary of Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL), represents the convergence of tradition, technology and innovation, building on India's rich maritime heritage to shape the future of shipbuilding.

A Legacy of Maritime Excellence

Kolkata, with the iconic Howrah Bridge, and the Hooghly River have been at the heart of Eastern India's maritime heritage for centuries. Hooghly-CSL carries forward this legacy, rooted in the historic Hooghly Docks, one of India's oldest shipyards, while embracing modern shipbuilding practices to meet the evolving requirements of India's maritime sector.

Hooghly-CSL was incorporated in 2017 as a joint venture between Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL) and Hooghly Dock and Port Engineers Limited (HDPEL), marking the beginning of the transformation of HDPEL's historic facilities into a modern shipbuilding hub. Following the approval of the Union Cabinet, Hooghly-CSL became a wholly owned subsidiary of CSL on November 1, 2019. Since then, extensive structural and technological upgrades have transformed the facility and strengthened its capabilities.

Aligned with the Government of India's vision for National Waterways under the Jal Marg Vikas Project, CSL

modernised the Nazirgunge unit into a state-of-the-art shipbuilding facility. Today, Hooghly-CSL is equipped to undertake shipbuilding and repair activities for specialised vessels across inland and coastal segments, supported by advanced technology, a skilled workforce and the proven technical standards of its parent company.

Quality, safety and environmental responsibility remain integral to our operations. Hooghly-CSL operates under a robust Integrated Management System (IMS) and holds certifications from the Indian Register of Shipping (IRS) under ISO 9001:2015 for Quality, ISO 14001:2015 for Environment and ISO 45001:2018 for Occupational Health & Safety.

Today, Hooghly-CSL stands at the intersection of India's rich maritime heritage and its aspirations for a modern, sustainable and self-reliant shipbuilding industry—building capabilities, creating opportunities and shaping the future of maritime development in Eastern India.

It gives me immense pleasure to present to you the Annual Report of Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited (Hooghly-CSL) for the financial year ended March 31, 2026.

The year under review marked another significant milestone in the Company's journey towards establishing itself as a capable and reliable shipbuilding yard in Eastern India. The Indian maritime sector continues to receive strong policy

support, with increased emphasis on inland waterways, green mobility, indigenous shipbuilding and port-led development. Against this backdrop, Hooghly-CSL continued to strengthen its capabilities, execute strategically important projects and expand its business portfolio while maintaining its focus on quality, innovation and sustainability.

As a wholly owned subsidiary of Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL), Hooghly-CSL continues to benefit

from the technical expertise and experience of its Holding Company while developing its own capabilities to serve the evolving requirements of India's maritime sector. Its strategic location at the epicentre of maritime activities on the East, modern infrastructure and dedicated workforce provide a strong foundation to cater to the growing demand for inland, coastal and specialised vessels.

I am pleased to highlight some of the key milestones achieved during the year. The most significant was the successful

completion and delivery of one Hybrid Electric Catamaran Passenger Vessel for the Inland Waterways Authority of India (IWAI). The vessel marks an important milestone for Hooghly-CSL and India's inland waterways sector by promoting clean and energy-efficient transportation. Its subsequent launch by the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India further underscored the strategic importance of the project and the Company's contribution to the nation's green mobility vision.

The Company had teething issues initially during the production ramp up, however a commendable progress is achieved in the construction of 40T ASD Bollard Pull Tugs, with the second tug successfully launched during the year and keel laying for the remaining vessels progressing as planned. Hooghly-CSL also achieved another significant milestone of the maiden vessel launch by the Yard with the launching of a 2,200 T Multi-Purpose Vessel being constructed for JAK Maritime & Logistics India Private Limited. Further, Hooghly-CSL secured contracts for the construction of Luxury River Cruise Vessels for Heritage River Journeys Private Limited., strengthening its presence in the inland waterways segment and diversifying its product portfolio. The Company also continued to progress its other ongoing projects and business initiatives. Our healthy order book reflects customer confidence in our engineering capabilities, project management and commitment to quality.

The Company's business activity witnessed significant growth during the year. Revenue from operations increased to ₹122.55 crore in FY 2025-26 from ₹57.75 crore in the previous financial year, while total income increased to ₹128.99 crore from ₹62.39 crore.

The Company, however, continued to incur a net loss after tax of ₹19.53 crore, as compared to ₹17.37 crore in the previous year. The Company remains focused on improving project execution, operational efficiency, cost management and resource utilisation, with the objective of improving its financial performance and achieving sustainable growth.

Corporate governance remains a paramount of our organisational philosophy. Hooghly-CSL is committed to transparency, accountability and ethical business practices, while ensuring compliance with the Companies Act, 2013, guidelines of the Department of Public Enterprises and other applicable statutory requirements. Sustainability remains integral to our business strategy. Through the construction of hybrid electric vessels and environmentally responsible shipbuilding practices, the Company is contributing to India's transition towards cleaner and greener maritime transportation. These efforts are aligned with the national priorities of "Make in India", "Atmanirbhar Bharat" and "Maritime India Vision 2030".

Our progress has been made possible by the dedication and professionalism of our employees. Their technical competence and commitment continue to drive the Company's growth. We remain committed to providing a safe and inclusive workplace while strengthening skills and capabilities to meet future requirements.

Looking ahead, the increasing focus on inland waterways, coastal shipping, green vessels, river cruise tourism and indigenous shipbuilding presents significant opportunities for Hooghly-CSL. With a modern facility, healthy

order pipeline, experienced workforce and continued guidance and support of Cochin Shipyard Limited, the Company is well positioned to capitalise on these opportunities and strengthen its contribution to India's maritime sector.

Our focus will remain on enhancing operational efficiency, timely project execution, technological innovation, quality and safety, while creating sustainable value for our stakeholders.

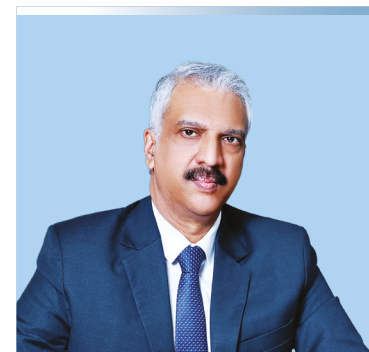

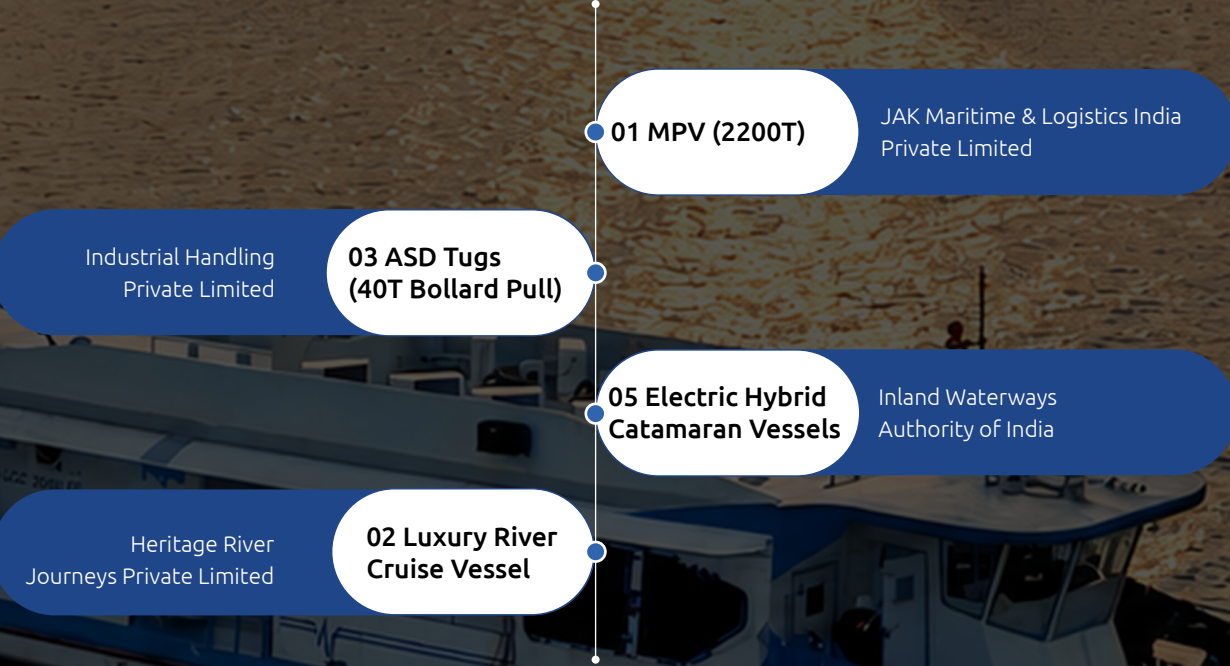

Board's Report

Dear Shareholders,

1. The Board of Directors is pleased to present the 09th Annual Report of the Company along with the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026, the Report of the Statutory Auditors and the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (C&AG) under Section 143 (6) (b) of the Companies Act, 2013.

About the Yard

2. Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited (Hooghly-CSL), a wholly owned subsidiary of Cochin Shipyard Limited, continues to strengthen its position as a key player in the inland and coastal shipbuilding segment in India. Strategically located along the Hooghly River, Hooghly-CSL caters to the growing demand for inland vessels, small coastal vessels, and specialized craft for both government and private clients.
3. Hooghly-CSL was initially set up as a joint venture between CSL and Hooghly Dock & Port Engineers Limited (HDPEL) on October 23, 2017. Pursuant to the approval of the Union Cabinet, CSL acquired the shares held by HDPEL and with effect from November 01, 2019, Hooghly-CSL became a wholly owned subsidiary of CSL.
4. The construction of the Yard with new state-of-the-art shipbuilding and repair facility at Nazirgunge, Howrah was completed and the facility was dedicated to the nation by Shri Sarbananda Sonowal, the Hon'ble Minister of Ports, Shipping & Waterways, Government of India, on August 16, 2022. The Facility has been set up in an area of 15.76 acres on the banks of river Hooghly with an intention to position itself as a premier shipbuilding/ repair yard on the east coast of India for inland and coastal vessels. Hooghly-CSL also has another unit at Salkia having 9.90 acres land, where developmental activities will be commenced in the near future.

Operations

5. The Company's operations during the year reflected steady progress in shipbuilding activities, aligned with national priorities for sustainable maritime growth, localization of shipbuilding, and the promotion of inland and coastal

waterways. During the year, Hooghly-CSL successfully delivered one Electric Hybrid Catamaran vessel to Inland Waterways Authority of India (IWAI), marking another milestone in its commitment to sustainable inland water transport. Further strengthening its order book, Hooghly-CSL also secured an order for the construction of two 80-passenger River Cruise Vessels from Heritage River Journeys Private Limited during the year under review.

6. The order book position of the Company as on March 31, 2026 is given below:

7. Further, Hooghly-CSL is serving as consultants for IWAI in setting up a new ship repair facility at Pandu, Assam. The Yard is also working towards completing the order for the design, construction, installation, and commissioning of a Box Caisson Gate from CSL to be positioned and commissioned at Netaji Subhas Dock at Syama Prasad Mookerjee Port, Kolkata. More than 98% of the work for the construction of the Box Caisson Gate is completed.
8. Your Directors are pleased to report that, as on March 31, 2026, Hooghly-CSL maintains an unexecuted order book valued at approximately ₹21,437 lakhs, providing a solid foundation for the Company's continued progress in the years ahead.

Financial Details

9. The Company has been incurring losses, attributable to the early stage of its commercial operations. In FY 2025-26, the Company incurred a loss of ₹1,953.36 lakhs as compared to ₹1,737.67 lakhs in FY 2024-25.

The entire paid-up share capital is held by Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL).

Debentures

12. As on March 31, 2026, the Company has outstanding 3,10,000 (Three Lakh Ten Thousand) Unsecured Redeemable Non-Convertible Debentures (debentures) of face value of ₹1,000 (Rupees One Thousand only) each, issued in the month of September 2021 with a tenure of 120 months (with an option to redeem after five years from the date of allotment) at a coupon rate of 6.15% per annum to CSL for an amount of ₹31,00,00,000 (Rupees Thirty One Crores only).

Dividend

13. No dividend is recommended as the Company is currently in the early stages of its operations and has no divisible profits.

Transfer to Reserves

14. As the Company recently began to commence its operations and has incurred a loss during the financial year 2025-26, the Company is unable to transfer any amount to the reserves.

Manpower Status

15. As on March 31, 2026, Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited has 74 employees consisting of 20 Executives, 5 Executive Trainees, 2 Supervisors, 4 Executives on Contract, 1 Senior Project Officer, 13 Project Officers, 4 regular Workmen and 25 On-Contract workmen. More vacancies in the Executive & Workmen positions will be filled up through public notifications as per the recruitment policy in a phased manner.

Industrial Relations

16. The Company maintained cordial industrial relations during the year and no man-hours were lost on account of labour unrest or strike.

Particulars of Employees and Related Disclosures

17. In accordance with Ministry of Corporate Affairs notification no. GSR 463(E) dated June 05, 2015, Government Companies are exempted from Section 197 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the rules made thereunder. Hence, details of remuneration of directors need not be included in the Board's report.

Conservation of Energy, Technology Absorption and Foreign Exchange Earnings and Outgo

18. The Centralized Energy Monitoring System installed at the Yard records the specific consumption of each equipment and helps the Yard in implementing the corrective actions, if required in accordance with the requirements. Particulars as required under Section 134 of the Companies

Act, 2013 relating to Conservation of Energy, Technology Absorption and Foreign Exchange Earnings and Outgo are placed at **Annexure I**.

Risk Management

19. Hooghly-CSL has adopted a comprehensive Risk Management Policy at the 23rd meeting of the Board of Directors held on August 04, 2022. The Company's risk management policy aims to put in place a comprehensive risk management system consisting of a defined process of risk management and methodology of identification, assessment, response, monitoring and reporting of risks. The policy provides the management and the Board of Directors an assurance that key risks are being properly identified and effectively managed.
20. As per the policy, Hooghly-CSL's Board at the helm will review the risk management system in Hooghly-CSL. The Board shall discharge its responsibility of risk oversight by ensuring the review at periodic intervals. The top management executives of Hooghly-CSL including the CEO and CFO have been entrusted with the implementation of the risk management process. In this respect, the Company has functional Risk Management Committees and the Risk Management Steering Committee to implement the policy in Hooghly-CSL. The Risk Management Committees and the Board of Directors periodically review the risk management process and policy. The Yard's product mix comprising of defence and commercial shipbuilding and ship repair gives the Company a natural hedge against market risk.

Health, Safety & Environment (HSE)

21. Hooghly-CSL maintains Integrated Management System (IMS) certification, encompassing ISO 9001:2015 (Quality Management System), ISO 14001:2015 (Environmental

Management System) and ISO 45001:2018 (Occupational Health and Safety Management System), from IRCLASS Systems and Solutions Private Limited. The Company recognizes the importance of HSE in achieving organizational objectives and places strong emphasis on fostering a positive health and safety culture across all levels. It is also committed to providing a safe and secure working environment.

22. A qualified and experienced Safety team, comprising Safety Assistants and Fire Watchmen, led by a dedicated Safety Officer, is deployed at the yard to ensure workforce safety. Additionally, an Electrical Safety Officer is assigned specifically to monitor the safety of electrical installations within the yard. Hooghly-CSL provides HSE (Health, Safety, and Environment) induction training to every workman upon joining and regularly conducts awareness programs such as toolbox talks, mock drills, and safety campaigns to promote active employee participation.
23. HSE compliance is reinforced through the maintenance of incident registers at worksites, periodic Safety Committee meetings, safety day celebrations, and other initiatives. The Company's HSE performance, monitored in terms of accident-free days, has been satisfactory during the reporting period, with no major incidents of work loss due to accidents were reported during the year. A Medical Officer is also available on-site to provide immediate medical support when required.

Interest amounting to ₹ 3.11 crore, received on such advances, have been recognized as income of during previous period also, up to 2024-25. A similar comment was issued by Audit, on the Financial Statement for 2024-25 but the company continued with practice of booking interest earned on advances as income. However, during 2025-26 it charged the cumulative amount of ₹ 6.11 crore as Expenditure which was not in line with Ind AS 8. The above has resulted in overstatement of Profit for the period (Negative Balance) by 3.11 crore and understatement of other Equity (Negative Balance) by the same amount. B. Comment on Financial Position Liabilities Current Liabilities Provision (Note No.25) ₹ 15.89 crore The above head includes an amount of ₹ 6.11 crore payable by Company to its client on account of interest earned/ accrued on advances (bank deposits) received from the client for under taking deposit work by Company. In view of there being no uncertainty regarding the timing or amount payable to the client it should have been recognized as Other Current liability instead of Provision. The above has resulted in overstatement of Provision by ₹ 6.11 crore and understatement of Other Current liabilities by ₹ 6.11.	Reply to the Comment: A. No specific clause either in the Agreement or in the Addendum No.1 to the agreement entered into with IWAI obligates the refund of interest income generated from temporary surplus project funds to the project owner. This position is explicitly supported by Clause 3(b)(vi), which states that the Company is not liable to pay interest on advance funds released. The accounting procedures, including the operation of a separate project account and the submission of monthly fund statements that exclude interest, have been consistently followed and accepted by the owner since the project's inception till the reporting date. Therefore, the Company's position is that there has been no understatement of loss by ₹3.11 crores for the financial year 2025-26 and company conservatively has provided liability for the entire interest amount of ₹ 6.11 Cr so earned of as expenditure for the financial year 2025-26. Provisions of IND AS 8 are not violated since the recognition of interest was neither an error nor a misapplication of accounting principles. B. The creation of the provision for ₹6.11 crore during FY 2025-26 was an act of accounting prudence as a conservative measure to create a buffer against a potential future claim, if any from IWAI and does not in any way represent an ascertained or crystallized liability. Based on our legal interpretation, no present obligation exists requiring the repayment of the interest earned. The agreement does not create a constructive or legal obligation to repay interest. Since, there is no obligation to pay the amount, recognition as Other current liability will not be prudent. Provisions and Other Liability are properly presented accordingly. In view of the above, there is no overstatement of provision by ₹ 6.11 crores and understatement of Other current liabilities by ₹ 6.11 crores.

Management Discussion and Analysis Report

Forward looking statements

1. Statements in this Management Discussion and Analysis of financial condition and results of operations of the Company describing the Company's objectives, expectations or predictions may be forward looking within the meaning of applicable securities laws and regulations. Forward-looking statements are based on certain assumptions and expectations of future events. The Company cannot guarantee that these assumptions and expectations are accurate or will be realised. The Company assumes no responsibility to publicly amend, modify or revise forward-looking statements on the basis of any subsequent developments, information or events. Actual results may differ materially from those expressed in the statement. Important factors that could influence the Company's operations include government's strategy relating to acquisition of naval platforms, changes in government regulations, tax laws, economic developments within the country and such other factors globally. The financial statements are prepared under historical cost convention, on accrual basis of accounting and in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 (the "Act") and comply with the Accounting Standards specified under Section 133 of the Act. The management of Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited ("Hooghly-CSL" or "the Company") has used estimates and judgments relating to the financial statements on a prudent and reasonable basis, in order that the financial statements reflect in a true and fair manner, the state of affairs for the year.
2. The following discussions on our financial condition and results of operations should be read together with our audited financial statements and the notes to these statements included in the annual report. Unless otherwise specified or the context otherwise requires, all references herein to "we", "us", "our", "the Company", "Hooghly Cochin Shipyard", "Hooghly-CSL", "Group" are with respect to Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited and its Holding Company.
- reinforcing the need for fleet renewal and modernization. Driven by increasingly stringent environmental regulations and the global transition towards low-carbon shipping, shipowners continued to invest in technologically advanced, fuel-efficient, and environmentally compliant vessels to enhance operational efficiency and meet evolving decarbonization requirements.
4. According to the International Monetary Fund (IMF), global economic growth is projected at around 3.0% in 2026, reflecting a gradual recovery amid persistent geopolitical and macroeconomic uncertainties. Although global seaborne trade growth is expected to remain subdued compared with previous years due to trade policy measures, regional conflicts, and supply chain disruptions, the long-term fundamentals of the maritime sector continue to support investments in fleet modernization and replacement.
5. China, South Korea, and Japan continued to dominate the global shipbuilding industry, accounting for the majority of commercial shipbuilding orders and deliveries. Demand remained robust for container vessels, LNG carriers, dual-fuel vessels, offshore support vessels, and other specialised ships. At the same time, investments in alternative-fuel technologies, including LNG, methanol, ammonia-ready, and other low-emission vessel designs, reflected the industry's continued transition towards greener and more sustainable shipping.
6. The global shipbuilding order book remained at healthy levels, providing sustained business visibility for major shipyards. However, constraints in shipyard capacity, rising construction costs, supply chain disruptions, and shortages of skilled manpower continued to influence new building prices and delivery schedules across several markets.
7. Looking ahead, the global shipbuilding industry is expected to maintain a positive long-term outlook, supported by sustained fleet replacement demand, increasingly stringent environmental regulations, growth in offshore and renewable energy sectors, and continued investments in digital shipbuilding technologies, automation, and alternative-fuel propulsion systems. While geopolitical uncertainties, supply chain constraints, and cost pressures may persist in the near term, these structural growth drivers are expected to create significant opportunities for technologically advanced and sustainable shipbuilding.

Shipbuilding Industry

Global Shipbuilding Industry

3. The global shipbuilding industry operated in a challenging yet resilient environment during FY 2025–26, shaped by geopolitical tensions, trade policy uncertainties, evolving supply chains, and changing patterns in global seaborne trade. These developments influenced international shipping routes, freight markets, and maritime logistics, while

Indian Shipbuilding Industry

8. India continues to strengthen its position as an emerging maritime nation, supported by robust economic growth, expanding port infrastructure, increasing coastal and inland waterway transportation, and sustained policy support for the maritime sector. The country's growing trade volumes, strategic geographic location, and increasing focus on self-reliance have created favourable conditions for the development of the domestic shipbuilding and ship repair industry.
9. The Indian shipbuilding industry comprises both public and private sector shipyards catering to commercial, offshore, defence and coastal vessel segments. Public sector shipyards continue to play a strategic role in the construction of complex naval and commercial vessels, while private shipyards have expanded their capabilities in building cargo vessels, offshore support vessels, tugs, patrol vessels, fishing vessels and specialised craft. The combined strengths of these shipyards are steadily enhancing India's indigenous shipbuilding capacity and technological capabilities.
10. Unlike traditional mass-manufacturing sectors, the shipbuilding industry operates on a custom, order-driven business model. As of FY25, India's aggregate order book reached 517 vessels totalling 797.3 thousand DWT. During FY25, Indian yards successfully delivered 259 ships with a combined tonnage of 65.1 thousand DWT, a 124.3% YoY surge compared to FY24 deliveries.
11. The industry is witnessing increasing demand driven by fleet replacement, coastal shipping, inland water transport, offshore energy, port development, and defence modernisation. Simultaneously, the global transition towards cleaner shipping is generating opportunities for Indian shipyards to participate in the construction of energy-efficient and alternative-fuel vessels, including LNG and other low-emission vessel designs.
12. Recognising the strategic importance of the maritime sector, the Government of India has continued to strengthen the policy framework through the Maritime India Vision 2030 (MIV 2030) and the Maritime Amrit Kaal Vision 2047 (MAKV 2047) aimed to enhance indigenous shipbuilding capacity, improve global competitiveness, promote technological advancement, and position India as an emerging hub for shipbuilding. The Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways has established the ViBhaS (Viksit Bharat Sankalp) and NAVIC (Neel Arth Vision Implementation Cells) framework to drive the implementation of MIV 2030 and MAKV 2047. The Government has set ambitious targets to elevate India's position to the 10th largest globally in ship owning and shipbuilding by 2030, and 5th by 2047. These targets are supported by targeted policy interventions and infrastructure development programmes. A comprehensive package of ₹69,725 crores has been approved by the Union Cabinet to revitalise India's shipbuilding and maritime sector.
13. The budgetary support for the Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways for the year 2026-27 in the Union Budget proposed ₹3,400 million, higher by 74.36% from the 2025-26 revised budgetary support. During the Union Budget 2025-26, ₹1,950 million has been allocated to the shipbuilding industry, an increase of 30.65% from previous year's budget. Additionally, the Government has announced ₹10,000 million Maritime Development Fund, a Shipbuilding Financial Assistance Scheme (SBFAS) with an outlay of ₹5,150 million and a ₹2,500 million for capacity and capability development and credit risk coverage for shipbuilding in India – Shipbuilding Development Scheme (SbDS). The SBFAS is designed to promote the domestic construction of large, green and specialised vessels and is expected to generate nearly ₹960 billion of shipbuilding activity, replacing the existing policy after March 2026. To improve industry participation, the scheme will be made more flexible, allowing shipyards to combine benefits with other central and state schemes, opt between old and new policies during the transition period and avail retrospective benefits for approved projects where applicable. The key policy initiatives of the Government of India for the Indian Shipping Industry are given below:

 Shipbuilding Financial Assistance Policy (SBFAP 2.0)	The Government of India has introduced the SBFAP 2.0 with a total outlay of ₹24,736 crores to enhance the cost competitiveness of Indian shipyards. 14. Demand for shipbuilding in India is majorly driven by defence, which is expected to continue and the defence shipbuilding order book is expected to grow by 8–9% over the coming years which is expected to boost the Indian shipbuilding industry. Recent government-led shipbuilding and maritime reforms are expected to further support the growth of India's shipbuilding sector. The measures focus on improving domestic capacity through financial support, long-term maritime financing and infrastructure development, aimed at reducing reliance on foreign-built vessels and improving competitiveness. These reforms have the potential to boost the shipbuilding capacity to 4.5 million GT and enable shipbuilding output of up to 8.2 million GT, along with the addition of over 2,500 vessels by 2047. The reforms are also expected to drive investments of about ₹4.5 trillion, supporting sustained growth in both commercial and defence shipbuilding in India and are aligned with India's objective of becoming the 10th largest ship owning and shipbuilding nation by 2030 and the 5th largest by 2047.

15. The medium-to-long-term outlook for the Indian shipbuilding industry remains positive. Rising domestic demand,

increasing investments in maritime infrastructure, sustained defence procurement, expansion of coastal and inland water transport, and supportive Government policies are expected to drive growth in shipbuilding and ship repair activities. At the same time, global supply constraints, increasing demand for specialised and environmentally compliant vessels, and the diversification of international supply chains present significant opportunities for Indian shipyards to enhance their presence in global markets. With continued investments in technology, infrastructure, skill development and operational excellence, the Indian shipbuilding industry is well positioned to emerge as an important contributor to the country's maritime economy and long-term industrial growth.

16. Against this favourable industry backdrop, Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited is well positioned to leverage the growing opportunities in the domestic and international shipbuilding markets through its established infrastructure, technical capabilities, support from its holding company, Cochin Shipyard Limited (CSL), and continued focus on quality, timely execution, and operational excellence.

Strategic Outlook and Future Plans

Capacity Expansion

17. Hooghly-CSL is exploring the expansion of its fabrication and assembly facilities to increase throughput and accommodate larger vessels by developing a side launch facility at Nazirgunge and operationalising its Salkia facility in the near future.

Technology Partnerships

18. The Company seeks collaborations with global firms for advanced ship design, hybrid propulsion, and digital integration.

Skill Development

19. Aligned with the Gati Shakti Vishwavidyalaya and other skilling initiatives, Hooghly-CSL supports training programs to upskill its workforce and build future-ready capabilities.

Operations

20. Hooghly-CSL, owing to its strategic location near National Waterways 1 and 2, is well suited for the construction of small and medium-sized vessels in a cost-effective manner. The Company entered the Electric Hybrid Catamaran segment

by signing an agreement with CSL on March 23, 2024, for the construction of six Electric Hybrid Catamaran vessels for the Inland Waterways Authority of India (IWAI). During FY 2025-26 Hooghly-CSL successfully delivered one Electric Hybrid Catamaran vessel to IWAI, marking another milestone in its commitment to sustainable inland water transport. Further, during FY 2025-26, the Company secured an order for the construction of two 80-Pax River Cruise Vessels from Heritage River Journeys Private Limited.

21. Hooghly-CSL is building two 40T ASD Bollard Pull Tugs for Industrial Handling Private Limited. Additionally, the Company is building one MPV (2200T) for JAK Maritime & Logistics India Private Limited. Further, Hooghly-CSL is also serving as consultants for IWAI in setting up a new ship repair facility at Pandu, Assam. The Yard is also working towards completing the order for the design, construction, installation, and commissioning of a Box Caisson Gate from CSL to be positioned and commissioned at Netaji Subhas Dock at Syama Prasad Mookerjee Port, Kolkata. More than 98% of the work for the construction of Box Caisson Gate is completed.

22. The Company has been incurring losses attributable to the early stage of its commercial operations. In FY 2026, the Company incurred a loss of ₹1,953.36 lakhs as compared to ₹1,737.67 lakhs in FY 2025. The financial highlights for the reporting period are given below:

- **Focus on Green Shipbuilding:** Early mover in hybrid and environmentally sustainable vessel construction, well aligned with India's green maritime initiatives.
- **Technology Support:** Strong design and technical backing from our parent company Cochin Shipyard Limited



Weakness

- **Order-driven Business:** Business growth depends on timely order inflows and efficient project execution.
- **Supply Chain Dependence:** Timely availability of steel, marine equipment and critical components remains essential for project execution.
- **Capacity Constraints:** Execution capacity is linked to the availability of infrastructure, skilled manpower and production resources.
- **Policy uncertainty:** While government initiatives are favorable, delays in project approvals or changes in subsidy structures could impact planning.



Opportunity

- **Policy Support:** Government initiatives such as Maritime India Vision 2030, SBFAP 2.0, GTTP and Sagarmala are expected to create a favorable growth environment for the domestic shipbuilding industry.
- **Ship Repair & Fleet Modernization:** Growing focus on domestic ship repair and replacement of ageing fleets presents significant long-term business opportunities.
- Expansion of inland waterways and coastal shipping.
- Export potential for hybrid and inland vessels.



Threat

- **Competitive Pressure:** Intense competition from domestic and global shipyards.
- **Input Cost & Supply Chain Risks:** Volatility in raw material prices and supply chain disruptions affecting project costs and timelines.
- **Execution Risks:** Delays in project execution or equipment failures may affect delivery schedules and customer confidence.
- **Cost Inflation:** Escalating material and labour costs may impact project profitability.
- **GST Structure Imbalance:** An imbalance between the GST applicable on raw material procurement and that on ship sales, leading to the accumulation of input tax credit and impacting working capital.

Risks and concerns

- 26 The risks faced by the Company are inherent to the shipbuilding industry and are linked to the cyclical nature of sectors such as oil and gas, shipping, transportation and other trade-related industries. As shipbuilding is an order-driven business, timely receipt of orders and their efficient execution are critical to maintaining a healthy order book and sustaining business growth. The Company also depends on the timely supply of key raw materials, equipment and components such as steel, engines, pumps and propellers. Any delay or disruption in the supply of these inputs may affect project schedules, operational efficiency and the Company's financial performance.

Further, the Company is exposed to operational risks associated with the failure, breakdown or underperformance of plant, machinery and equipment. Such incidents may lead to operational disruptions, including fire or explosions, which could affect construction schedules and delay the delivery of vessels to customers

Internal Control

27. The Company has adopted robust policies and procedures to ensure the orderly and efficient conduct of the Company's business by safeguarding its assets, preventing and detecting errors and frauds, ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records and the timely preparation and submission of reliable financial disclosures.

Human Resource Development and Industrial Relations

28. As on March 31, 2026, the Company has 74 employees consisting of 20 Executives, 5 Executive Trainees, 2 Supervisors, 4 Executives on Contract, 1 Senior Project Officer, 13 Project Officers, 4 regular Workmen and 25 On-Contract workmen. More vacancies in the Executive & Workmen positions will be filled up through public notifications as per the recruitment policy in phased manner. During the reporting period, the Company maintained cordial industrial relations and no man hours were lost on account of labour unrest or strike.

Environmental Protection and Conservation, Technological conservation, Renewable Energy Developments, Foreign Exchange Conservation

29. The Centralized Energy Monitoring System installed at the Yard records the specific consumption of each equipment and helps the Yard in implementing the corrective actions, if required in accordance with the requirements. The yard is working towards ISO 50001, which is an internationally recognized standard that provides organizations with a structured framework to establish, implement, and improve an Energy Management System (EnMS). The details of expenses incurred by the Company in foreign currency during the financial year 2026 forms part of Directors Report.

Corporate Social Responsibility

30. The Company does not fall within the purview of Section 135 of the Companies Act, 2013 which relates to CSR.

Report on the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying standalone financial statements of HOOGHLY COCHIN SHIPYARD LIMITED (the "Company"), which comprise the Balance sheet as at 31st, March, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss, the Statement of Changes in Equity and the Statement of Cash Flows for the year ended on that date and notes to the financial statements, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information (hereinafter referred to as the "standalone financial statements").

In our opinion and to best of our information and according to the explanation given to us, the aforesaid standalone financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act, 2013 as amended (the "Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the Indian Accounting Standards prescribed under section 133 of the Act read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015, as amended, ("Ind AS") and other accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March, 31, 2026, and loss and changes in equity and its cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit the standalone financial statements in accordance with the standards on Auditing ("SA") specified under section 143 (10) of the Act. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Standalone Financial Statements section of our Report. We are Independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India ("ICAI") together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the standalone financial statements under the provision of the Act and the Rules made thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the ICAI's Code of ethics. We believe that the audit evidence obtained by us is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion on the standalone financial statements.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgment, were most significant in our audit of the standalone financial statements of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the standalone financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon. We have determined the matter described below to be the Key Audit Matter to be communicated in our report.

(a) REVENUE RECOGNITION

The Company's main source of revenue arises from ship building and ship repairing contracts and also from service charges and Ship Building Financial Assistance Policy (SBAF) of Government of India. Ship Building and Ship Repair revenue is recognized when the Company satisfies performance obligations by transferring promised goods and services to the customer in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods and services using output method under IND AS 115 measuring the progress based on performance up to reporting date, which is representative of the satisfaction of the performance obligation subject to entitlement of consideration in exchange of goods and services.

In the case of ship repair contracts involving continuous maintenance support /recurring and routine services, the Company opted for time elapsed output method i.e. measuring the progress based on time elapsed to reporting date, which is representative of the satisfaction of performance obligation subject to entitlement of consideration in exchange of goods and/or services.

The measurement of progress towards complete satisfaction of a performance obligation is based on technical assessment and is revised/updated on an ongoing basis.

As disclosed in Note 26 the Company earned a sum of ₹12,255.35 Lakhs from ship building and ship repair services, service charges and SBAF during the year ended 31st March, 2026.

Revenue recognition is treated as a KEY AUDIT MATTER due to the fact that significant estimates are involved in determination of stage of completion and measurement of progress towards satisfaction of performance obligations and estimating costs to complete of each contract. Contract modifications are accounted for when additions, deletions or changes are approved either to contract scope or contract price.

How the matter was addressed during the audit:-

We obtained an understanding of the Company's controls over the revenue and cost recognition process to assess the design of the key controls in place. Our audit procedures included verification of the contracts and service orders to evaluate management's assessment of performance obligations in accordance with Ind AS 115; Obtaining cost estimation schedules approved by project teams and verifying the costs to complete by checking evidence of committed expenditure, budgeted rates and actual costs incurred to date; Review of correspondences to corroborate management's assessment of liquidated damages payable that may arise as per terms of contract due to probable delivery time overrun; Checking the calculation of provision made for estimated losses.

(b) PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT AND INTANGIBLE ASSETS (INCLUDING CAPITAL WORK IN PROGRESS)

Considerable management judgement is required to determine carrying values and their respective depreciation and amortisation amounts of property, Plant and Equipment (PPE), Capital Work in Progress (CWIP) and Intangible Asset (IA) .These include the decisions to capitalise costs or charge to revenue , the asset life cycle, the timeliness of the capitalisation of assets and putting to use and the use of management's assumptions and estimates for the determination and measurement of assets retired from active use, in accordance with the requirements of INDAS 16 – Property, Plant and Equipment ('INDAS 16') and INDAS 38 – Intangible Assets ('INDAS 38').

As at 31st March 2026 the Company had PPE, CWIP and IA and with carrying value of respectively, ₹ 14,904.26 lakhs, ₹ 63.24 lakhs and ₹ 554.16 lakhs and as disclosed in note 3, note 4 and note 5 of the accompanying Standalone Financial Statements. Refer note 2B on the material accounting policy information adopted by the Company for recognition and measurement of such Property, Plant & Equipment.

The carrying value of CWIP also includes balances pertaining to long term projects which requires careful examination of continuity and viability of such projects.

Considering the significance of amounts involved in the context of the Balance Sheet of the Company and the level of judgement and estimates required, we consider this to be a key audit matter in the current year audit. This was also considered a key audit matter in the previous year.

How the matter was addressed during the audit:-

Our audit procedures included, but were not limited to the following: we obtained an understanding of the management's process of recording the transactions pertaining to capital expenditures incurred by the company and evaluated, the accounting policies adopted by the company in accordance with the requirements of INDAS 16 and INDAS 38.

Evaluated the design and tested the operating effectiveness of the controls put in place by the management in relation to the above process.

Tested all the amounts capitalized during the year, by inspecting the invoices and certificates of capitalization after evaluating whether assets capitalized satisfied the recognition criteria and were recognized accurately in the correct periods and with correct amounts.

Reviewed the judgements made by management in determination of carrying values of the specified non-current assets including the nature of underlying costs capitalized, determination of realizable value of the assets retired from active use, the appropriateness of useful lives applied in the calculation of depreciation as determined by technical assessment by management and external technical experts, where required.

Evaluation of appropriateness of long standing CWIP balances pertaining to long-term projects.

Evaluated the appropriateness and adequacy of the related disclosures in the Standalone Financial Statements in accordance with the applicable accounting standards.

Emphasis of Matter

01. Lease Accounting

Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited (HCSL) is following IND AS-116 for accounting of Lease in respect of its Leasehold Land. However, lease term and effective dates considered by HCSL for computation are not in agreement with provisions of the Deed of Declaration dated 23rd September, 2021 (DEED) between HCSL and President of India (Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways). This DEED, read with Principal Deed of Lease dated 19th January, 2018 is the governing agreement for leasehold

land of HCSL. HCSL has recognized Lease rent based on the original Lease agreement signed on 19th January, 2018, which was subsequently revised because of operation of law due to exit of HDPEL. Lease Term and effective dates should be made in parity with the provisions of the DEED for valuation of lease liability and ROU assets in the books of accounts.

02. Provision for Interest on delayed payment of Lease Rent to Government of India.

HCSL had paid Lease Rent for its leasehold lands to Hooghly Dock & Port Engineers Ltd. (HDPEL) (now defunct), as follows:-

Thereafter, pending lease rent from November, 2019 (in respect of Areas A & B) and from 01-January-2020 (in respect of Area C) to September, 2024 was paid to Government of India (Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Waterways) in August, 2024.

Provision for Interest on delayed payment of ₹ 54.76 Lakhs (Previous Year NIL) was made in the accounts for the FY 2024-25 considering benchmark interest rate (SBI 6 months MCLR) @ 8.9% + 2% = 10.9% p.a.

However, Lease Rent payable was computed by HCSL from 16-Feb-2019, 01-July, 2019 and 01-January-2020 for Areas A, B & C respectively. Lease Rent for the period from 19-January- 2018 (effective date) as per Deed of Declaration and interests thereon for the period from 19-January, 2018 to 15-Feb-2019, 30-June, 2019 and 31-December-2019 respectively (Rupees 27.84 Lakhs) was not considered by HCSL. Commencement date of lease and lease rent considered by HCSL are not in agreement with the Deed of Declaration dated 23rd September, 2021 between HCSL and President of India (Ministry of Ports, Shipping & Waterways).

03. Construction of Caisson Gate

Percentage of completion 98.75% (PY-98.75%). Delivery date expired on March 31, 2023. There was no progress in completion during the year ended 31st March, 2026 -while direct expenses increased by a further ₹ 6.02 lakhs. Delay in completion of the project at the end stage is leading to increase in project cost.

04. Shipbuilding Financial Assistance Policy (SBFAP) of Ministry of Ports, Shipping & Waterways, Government of India.

Income for the year ended 31st March, 2026 includes ₹ 1236.77 Lakhs (PY-₹188.02 Lakhs) recognized as per Ship Building Financial Assistance Policy of Government of India, realization of which is subject to timely delivery of the tugs and fulfilment of other conditions of the SBFAP. However final approval is pending in respect of an amount of ₹218.42 Lakhs for MPV JAK Vessel .

Our opinion is not modified in respect of these matters.

Management's Responsibilities for the standalone Financial Statements

The Company's Board of Directors is responsible for the matter stated in section 134(5) of the Act with respect the preparation of these standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance, changes in equity and cash flows of the Company in accordance with the Ind AS and other accounting principles generally accepted in India.

This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provision of the Act for safeguarding the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for insuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting reports, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the standalone financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free material misstatement , whether due to fraud or error .

In preparation the standalone financial statement, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Board of Director are responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process .

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Standalone Financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the standalone financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is no guarantee that

an audit conducted in accordance with SAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decision of users taken on the basis of these standalone financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with SAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also

Report on the Directions under section 143(5) of the Companies Act, 2013 of the year ended 31st March, 2026

Based on the verification of the records of the Company and based on information and explanations given to us we give here below a report on the Directions issued by the Comptroller and Auditor General of India of terms of section 143(5) of the Act:

- I. Assess the fair valuation of all the investments, both quoted and unquoted, made directly by the Company or through Trusts, for Post Retirement benefits of the employees. This includes verifying valuation methodologies, ensuring consistency with IND AS and reviewing supporting documentation. The auditor shall provide a brief note on the valuation approach, its reasonability, and compliance with applicable regulations, reporting any material deviations or misstatements.

Answer:

As per information and explanations received from the management, the Company has not made any investments, whether quoted or unquoted, either directly or through any trust, for the purpose of funding post-retirement benefits of employees during the year.

Accordingly, the requirement to assess the fair valuation of such investments, including verification of valuation methodologies, consistency with applicable Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS), and review of supporting documentation, does not arise.

Based on our examination of the books of account and records and according to the information and explanations given to us, no such investments exist as at the reporting date. Hence, there are no matters to be reported regarding valuation, reasonability, or compliance in this regard.

- II. Whether the Company has a system in place to process all the accounting transactions through IT system? The system is built to provide assurance to management and Board of Directors that key risks are being effectively identified and properly managed.

- (a) The Policy has been formulated in line with the Risk Management Policy of its Holding Company, Cochin Shipyards Limited which in our opinion, has taken global best practices into account while framing the policy.
- (b) The Company has not identified any data assets for the purpose of valuation.

Material Accounting Policy Information

1. Corporate Information:

Hooghly Cochin Shipyard Limited (HCSL), a company engaged in manufacturing and repair of commercial ships, barges and tugs for domestic and international clients has been incorporated on 23rd October, 2017. It is 100% Subsidiary of Cochin Shipyard Limited (A Govt of India Enterprise, CPSE- "Miniratna" Schedule-A Category-I).

The Registered Office of the Company is situated at Administrative Building, HCSL Premises, Satyen Bose Road, Danesh Sheikh Lane, Nazirgunge, Howrah - 711109. At present, only the Nazirgunge facility has undergone the major facility restructuring and the yard has commenced its commercial operation from FY 2022-23.

As at 31.03.2026, Cochin Shipyard Limited hold 100% of the Company's equity share Capital.

The financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026 were approved by the Board of Directors and authorized for issue on Apr 24, 2026, which are subject to the supplementary audit by the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (C&AG) and final approval of the Shareholders.

Basis of preparation and presentation of Financial Statements

Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (referred to as "Ind AS") as prescribed under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 as amended from time to time and other Accounting Principles generally accepted in India.

The Balance Sheet, the Statement of Profit and Loss and the Statement of Changes in Equity are prepared and presented in the format prescribed in the Division II of Schedule III to the Companies Act, 2013 (the Act). The Statement of Cash Flows has been prepared and presented in accordance with Ind AS 7 "Statement of Cash Flows". The disclosures with respect to items in the Balance Sheet and Statement of Profit and Loss, as prescribed in the Schedule III to the Act, are presented by way of notes forming part of the financial statements along with the other notes required to be disclosed under the notified Accounting Standards and the SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 as amended.

Functional and Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (₹) which is Company's presentation and functional currency and all values are rounded to the nearest lakhs (rounded off to two decimals) as permitted by Schedule III of the Act except when otherwise indicated.

Basis of Measurement

These financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, except for certain financial instruments which are measured at fair values at the end of each reporting period, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.

Current/ Non-Current Classification

An Asset/ liability is classified as current if it satisfies any of the following conditions:

- i. the asset/ liability is expected to be realized/ settled in the Company's normal operating cycle;
- ii. the asset is intended for sale or consumption;
- iii. the asset/ liability is held primarily for the purpose of trading;
- iv. the asset/ liability is expected to be realized/ settled within twelve months after the reporting period;
- v. the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless it is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle to settle a liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date;
- vi. in the case of a liability, the company does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date.

All other assets and liabilities are classified as non-current.

For the purpose of current/ non-current classification of assets and liabilities, the company has ascertained its normal operating cycle of different business activities as follows:

- (i) In case of ship building and ship repair, normal operating cycle is considered vessel wise, as the time

period from the effective date of contract to the date of to the date of expiry of warranty period.

- (ii) In the case of other business activities, normal operating cycle is 12 months.

Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with the Ind AS requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities and disclosures as at date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of the revenues and expenses for the years presented. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates under different assumptions and conditions.

Future results could differ due to changes in these estimates and the difference between the actual result and the estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known/materialize.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis.

Critical Accounting estimates and judgments:

The application of accounting policies that require critical accounting estimates involving complex and subjective judgments and the use of assumptions in the financial statements have been disclosed below:

Valuation of deferred tax assets / liabilities

The Company reviews the carrying amount of deferred tax assets / liabilities at the end of each reporting period. Significant judgments are involved in determining the elements of deferred tax items.

Leases

The Company evaluates if an arrangement qualifies to be a lease as per the requirements of Ind AS 116. Identification of a lease requires significant judgment. The Company uses significant judgments in assessing the lease term (including anticipated renewals) and the applicable discount rate. The classification of the leasing arrangement as a finance lease or operating lease is based on an assessment of several factors, including, but not limited to, transfer of ownership of leased asset at end of lease term, lessee's option to purchase and estimated certainty of exercise of such option, proportion of lease term to the asset's

economic life, proportion of present value of minimum lease payments to fair value of leased asset and extent of specialized nature of the leased asset.

For computation of lease liability, Ind AS 116 requires lessee to use their incremental borrowing rate as discount rate if the rate implicit in the lease contract cannot be readily determined.

For leases denominated in Company's functional currency, the Company considers the incremental borrowing rate to be the interest rate on borrowings from banks available to the company.

Provision towards Guarantee repairs

A provision is made towards guarantee repairs/claims in respect of newly built ships/small crafts delivered and repaired ships on the basis of the technical estimation done by the Company. The guarantee claims received from the ship owners are reviewed every year till settlement of the same. In case of a shortfall in the provision made earlier, additional provisions are made.

Litigations

From time to time, the Company is subject to legal proceedings and the ultimate outcome of each being always subject to many uncertainties inherent in litigation. A provision for litigation is made when it is considered probable that a payment will be made and the amount of the loss can be reasonably estimated. Significant judgment is made when evaluating, among other factors, the probability of unfavorable outcome and the liability to make a reasonable estimate of the amount of potential loss. Provision for litigations are reviewed at the end of each accounting period and revisions made for the changes in facts and circumstances.

Fair value measurements

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date under current market conditions.

The Company categorizes assets and liabilities measured at fair value into one of three levels depending on the ability to observe inputs employed in their measurement which are described as follows:

- (a) Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

- (b) Level 2 inputs are inputs that are observable, either directly or indirectly, other than quoted prices included within level 1 for the asset or liability.
- (c) Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability reflecting significant modifications to observable related market data or Company's assumptions about pricing by market participants.

Management applies valuation techniques to determine the fair value of financial instruments (where active market quotes are not available) and non-financial assets. This involves developing estimates and assumptions consistent with how market participants would price the instrument. Management bases its assumptions on observable data as far as possible but this is not always available. In that case management uses the best information available. Estimated fair values may vary from the actual prices that would be achieved in an arm's length transaction at the reporting date.

Liquidated Damages

Claims for liquidated damages against the Company are recognized in the financial statements based on the management's assessment of the probable outcome with reference to the available information supplemented by experience of similar transactions.

Revenue Recognition

The Company exercises significant judgment in measuring progress of performance obligations satisfied over time for recognition of revenue from contracts with customers.

Revenue is recognized over time by measuring the work carried out or survey of performance completed to date under output method. Under this method, works completed to date in each contract are the basis to measure and recognize revenue. The quantum is calculated by each project team based on the technical progress up to the reporting date. The revenue recognized reflects the value of works completed/ measured to date in line with the consideration as determined in the respective contracts.

Provision for estimated losses if any, on the uncompleted part of the contracts are provided in the period in which such losses become probable based on the expected contract estimates at the reporting date.

Recognition and measurement of defined benefit obligations

The obligation arising from defined benefit plan is determined on the basis of actuarial assumptions. Key actuarial assumptions include discount rate, trends in salary escalation and vested future benefits and life expectancy. The discount rate is determined with reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on the Government bonds. The period to maturity of the underlying bonds correspond to the probable maturity of the post employment benefit obligations.

2. Changes in Accounting Policies

A. Deferred Tax related to assets and liabilities arising from a single transaction

The Company has adopted Deferred Tax related to Assets and Liabilities arising from a Single Transaction (Amendments to Ind AS 12) from 1st April, 2023. The amendments narrow the scope of the initial recognition exemption to exclude transactions that give rise to equal and offsetting temporary differences - e.g. leases and decommissioning liabilities. For leases and decommissioning liabilities, an entity is required to recognize the associated deferred tax assets and liabilities from the beginning of the earliest comparative period presented, with any cumulative effect recognized as an adjustment to retained earnings or other components of equity at that date. For all other transactions, Company applies the amendments to transactions that occur on or after the beginning of the earliest period presented.

The Company previously accounted for deferred tax on leases by applying the 'integrally linked' approach, resulting in a similar outcome as under the amendments, except that the deferred tax asset or liability was recognized on a net basis.

Following the amendments, the Company has recognized a separate deferred tax asset in relation to its lease liabilities and a deferred tax liability in relation to its right-of-use assets.

However, there was no impact on the statement of financial position i.e., Balance Sheet because the balances qualify for offset under paragraph 74 of Ind AS 12. There was also no impact on the opening retained earnings as at 01st April, 2022 as a result of the change.

B. Material accounting policy information

The Company adopted Disclosure of Accounting Policies (Amendments to Ind AS 1) from 1st April, 2023. This amendment did not result in any changes in the accounting policies themselves and also did not result in any significant impact in the accounting policy information disclosed in the financial statements.

The amendments require the disclosure of 'material accounting policy information', rather than 'significant accounting policies'. The amendments also provide guidance on the application of materiality in disclosing accounting policies to provide useful, Company specific accounting policy information that users need to understand along with other material information in this financial statements.

Management reviewed the accounting policies and made updates to the information disclosed in Material Accounting Policy Information in line with the amendment.

Material Accounting Policy Information

The Company has consistently applied all the accounting policies to the period presented in this financial statements except

- where a newly issued Accounting Standard is initially adopted or
- a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

The Company presents the material accounting policies under this note, which should be read in conjunction with the information presented and disclosed in the relevant notes referred under these standalone financial statements and are considered to be "Material Accounting Policy Information".

Accounting policies at **31.03.2026** have been modified/ reworded to bring more clarity to the users of the financial statements which do not have any impact on this financial statements.

Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

(Relevant information is presented in the Note No.3 to the Standalone Financial Statements)

Recognition and Measurement:

Items of Property, Plant and Equipment are measured at cost, which includes capitalized borrowing costs,

less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

If significant parts of an item of Property, Plant and Equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of Property, Plant and Equipment.

Spare Parts are capitalized when they meet the definition of Property, Plant and Equipment, i.e., when the Company intends to use these for a period exceeding 12 months, have value of more than ₹5 Lakhs and that can be used only in connection with an item of property, plant and equipment and whose use is expected to be irregular are capitalized and depreciated over the useful life of the spares or principal item of the relevant assets, whichever is lower.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of Property, Plant and Equipment is recognized in the statement of profit and loss account.

Subsequent Expenditure:

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the items is material and can be measured reliably.

Capital work in progress

Capital work in progress are property, plant and equipment that are not yet ready for their intended use at the reporting date, which are carried at cost, comprising direct cost, related incidental expenses and attributable borrowing cost.

Expenditure incurred on assets under construction (including a project) is carried at cost under Capital work in Progress ('CWIP').

Intangible Assets

Design development: Cost incurred on Design Development which is not directly chargeable on a product are capitalized as Intangible Asset and amortized on a straight-line basis over a period of five years.

Software: Cost of software which is not an integral part of the related hardware acquired for internal use is capitalized as intangible asset and amortized on a straight-line basis over a period of three years.

Internally generated procedure: Cost of internally generated weld procedure is capitalized as Intangible Asset and amortized on a straight-line basis over a period of three years.

Intangible Asset (Value of Leasehold Land): Upfront payments towards Leasehold Land and associated expenditures are amortized on a straight-line basis over the period for which the right is acquired, commencing from the date on which the right becomes capable of being exercised.

Research and development expenditure on new products:

1. Expenditure on research is expensed in the period in which it is incurred.
2. Development expenditure on new products is capitalized as intangible asset, if all of the following can be demonstrated:
 - a. the technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that it will be available for use or sale;
 - b. the Company has intention to complete the intangible asset and use or sell it;
 - c. the Company has ability to use or sell the intangible asset;
 - d. the manner in which the probable future economic benefits will be generated including the existence of a market for output of the intangible asset or intangible asset itself or if it is to be used internally, the usefulness of intangible assets; the availability of adequate technical, financial and other resources to complete the development and to use or sell the intangible asset; and
 - e. the Company has ability to reliably measure the expenditure attributable to the intangible asset during its development.
3. Development expenditure that does not meet the above criteria is expensed in the period in which it is incurred.

The residual values, useful lives and methods of amortization of intangible assets are reviewed at each financial year end and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Computer software/ license is under development or is not yet ready for use, accumulated cost incurred on such items are accounted as "Intangible Assets Under Development"

Leases

(Relevant information is presented in the **Note No.5** to the Financial Statements)

The Company assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

The Company's lease asset classes primarily consist of leases for Land and Buildings.

As a Lessee:

At the date of commencement of the lease, the Company recognizes a lease liability and a corresponding right-of-use ("RoU") asset for all lease arrangements in which it is a lessee, except for leases with a term of twelve months or less (short term leases) and leases of low value assets. For these short term and leases of low value assets, the Company recognizes the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis or another systematic basis over the term of the lease.

Right of Use (RoU) Assets

The right-of-use assets are initially recognized at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or prior to the commencement date of the lease plus any initial direct costs less any lease incentives. They are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any. Right-of-use assets are depreciated from the commencement date on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and useful life of the underlying asset.

Lease Liabilities

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the future lease payments ie., amortized cost under effective interest method. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if not readily determinable, using the incremental borrowing rates.

The lease liability is subsequently remeasured by increasing the carrying amount to reflect interest on the lease liability and reducing the carrying amount to reflect the lease payments made.

A lease liability is remeasured upon the occurrence of certain events such as a change in the lease term or a change in an index or rate used to determine lease payments.

When a lease liability is remeasured, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of right of use asset, or is recorded in statement of profit and loss, if carrying amount of the right of use asset has been reduced to nil

Modifications to a lease agreement beyond the original terms and conditions are generally accounted for as a re-measurement of the lease liability with a corresponding adjustment to the RoU asset. Any gain or loss on modification is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. However, the modifications that increase the scope of the lease by adding the right to use one or more underlying assets at a price commensurate with the stand-alone selling price are accounted for as a separate new lease. In case of lease modifications, discounting rates used for measurement of lease liability and RoU assets is also suitably adjusted.

As a lessor:

Leases for which the Company is a lessor is classified as a finance or operating lease.

For operating leases, rental income is recognized on a straight line basis or another systematic basis over the term of the relevant lease. The difference between the amount recognized as lease rental income and actual cashflows receivable as per the lease agreement is adjusted in ("Accrued Lease Rental asset").

Depreciation

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is provided on straight-line method based on useful life of the asset as prescribed in part C of Schedule II to the Companies Act, 2013 except to the extent described below:

* Assets on leased premises are depreciated from the commencement date on a straight line basis over the shorter of its the end of the useful life of the Right Of Use asset/ Assets on leased premises or the end of the lease term.

*Management believes that useful life of assets is same as those prescribed in Part C of Schedule II to the Act. Useful life of the Asset is reviewed time to time based on the technical evaluation and necessary changes are made accordingly.

* Depreciation on additions/deletions to Gross Block is calculated on pro-rata basis from the date of such additions and up to the date of such deletions.

Depreciable amount is the cost of an asset, or other amount substituted for cost, less its residual value. A maximum residual value of 5% of original cost is considered for all categories of assets.

Depreciation method, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

Based on the technical evaluation of the management, for few categories of plant and machinery, the useful life is determined on double shift basis.

Capital Work in Progress included under Property, Plant and equipments are not depreciated as these assets are not yet available for use. However, they are tested for impairment if any.

Inventories

Raw materials and components are valued at weighted average cost method. When they are intended to project use, valuation is done at project specific weighted average cost method.

Stores and spares are valued at weighted average cost method.

Goods in transit are valued at cost.

Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognized when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

Equity Instruments

An equity instrument is a contract that evidences residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments are recognized at the proceeds received net of direct issue cost.

Financial Assets

Initial recognition and measurement

All Financial Assets other than trade receivables are recognized initially at fair value plus, in the case of financial assets not recorded at fair value through profit or loss, transaction cost that are attributable to the acquisition of the Financial Asset. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss are recognized immediately in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Subsequent measurement

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, Financial Assets are classified in three categories:

- * Financial assets at amortized cost;
- * Financial assets at Fair Value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI);
- * Financial assets at Fair Value through statement of profit and loss (FVTPL);

Financial assets at amortized cost

Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortized cost if these financial assets are held within a business whose objective is to hold these assets in order to collect contractual cash flows and the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Financial assets at Fair Value through other comprehensive income (FVTOCI)

Financial assets are measured at fair value through other comprehensive income if these financial assets are held within a business whose objective is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flows that give rise on specified dates to solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and by selling financial assets.

Financial assets at Fair Value through statement of profit and loss (FVTPL)

Financial assets are measured at fair value through profit or loss unless it is measured at amortized cost or at fair value through other comprehensive income on initial recognition. The transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are immediately recognized in statement of profit and loss.

Investments

All equity investments in scope of Ind AS 109 Financial Instruments are measured at fair value. Equity instruments which are held for trading are classified as at FVTPL. For all other equity instruments, the Company had made an irrevocable election to present the subsequent changes in the fair value in other comprehensive income. The Company makes such election on an instrument-by-instrument basis. The classification is made on initial recognition/transition and is irrevocable.

There is no recycling/reclassification of the amounts from OCI to the Statement of Profit and Loss, even on sale/disposal of the said equity investments.

Investment in preference shares/debentures of the subsidiaries are treated as equity instruments if the same are convertible into equity shares. Investment in preference shares/debentures not meeting the aforesaid condition is classified as debt instruments at amortized cost.

Investment in a 'debt instrument' is measured at the amortized cost if both the following conditions are met: The asset is held within a business model whose objective is -

- (1) To hold assets for collecting contractual cash flows, and
- (2) Contractual terms of the asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest (SPPI) on the principal amount outstanding.

Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium and fees or costs that are an integral part of the Effective Interest Rate (EIR). The EIR amortization is included in other income in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Impairment of Financial Assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, the Company applies Expected Credit Loss (ECL) model for measurement and recognition of impairment loss on the following financial assets and credit risk exposure:

- a) Financial Assets that are Debt Instruments, and are measured at amortized cost e.g., loans, debt securities, deposits, trade receivables and bank balance

- b) Financial guarantee contracts which are not subsequently measured as at FVTPL
- c) Lease Receivables under Ind AS 116

Simplified Approach

The Company follows 'simplified approach' for recognition of impairment loss allowance on Trade Receivables.

Trade Receivables

The Company classifies the right to consideration in exchange for deliverables as either a receivable or as contract asset. A receivable is a right to consideration that is unconditional and only the passage of time is required before the payment of that consideration is due.

The Company assesses at each Balance Sheet date whether a financial asset or a group of financial asset is impaired. Ind AS 109 requires expected credit loss to be measured through a loss allowance.

The Company recognizes lifetime expected credit losses for all trade receivables that do not constitute a financing transaction. Impairment loss allowance is based on a simplified approach as permitted by Ind AS 109. As a practical expedient, the company uses a provision matrix to determine the impairment loss on the portfolio of its trade receivables.

The provision matrix is based on its historically observed default rates over the expected life of the trade receivables and is adjusted for forward-looking estimates. At every reporting date, the historical observed default rates are updated and changes in the forward-looking estimates are analyzed. On that basis, the Company estimates provision on trade receivables at the reporting date.

Impairment loss allowance (or reversal) that is required to be recognized at the reporting date is recognized as an impairment loss or gain in the Statement of Profit & Loss Account.

General Approach

For recognition of impairment loss on other financial assets and risk exposure, the Company determines that whether there has been a significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition. If credit risk has not increased significantly, 12-months ECL is used to provide for impairment loss. However, if credit risk has increased significantly, lifetime ECL is used. If, in a subsequent period, credit quality of the instrument improves such that there is no longer a significant increase in credit risk since

initial recognition, then the entity reverts to recognizing impairment loss allowance based on 12-months ECL.

Lifetime ECL are the expected credit losses resulting from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument. The 12-months ECL is a portion of the lifetime ECL which results from default events that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date.

ECL impairment loss allowance (or reversal) recognized during the period is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. The Balance Sheet presentation for various financial instruments is described below:

* Financial Assets measured as at amortized cost: ECL is presented as an allowance, i.e., as an integral part of the measurement of those assets in the Balance Sheet. The allowance reduces the net carrying amount. Until the asset meets write-off criteria, the Company does not reduce impairment allowance from the gross carrying amount.

* Financial Guarantee contracts: ECL is presented as a provision in the Balance Sheet, i.e. as a liability.

* Debt instruments measured at FVTOCI: Since financial assets are already reflected at fair value, impairment allowance is not further reduced from its value. Rather, ECL amount is presented as 'accumulated impairment amount' in the OCI.

Financial liabilities

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial Liabilities are classified, at initial recognition, as financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss and financial liabilities at amortized cost, as appropriate.

All Financial Liabilities are recognized initially at fair value and, in the case of liabilities subsequently measured at amortized cost, they are measured net of directly attributable transaction cost. In case of Financial Liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial liabilities are recognized immediately in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

The Company's Financial Liabilities include trade and other payables, loans and borrowings including financial guarantee contracts and derivative financial instruments."

Subsequent measurement

The measurement of financial liabilities depends on their classification, as described below:

* Financial liabilities at Fair Value through statement of profit and loss (FVTPL);

* Financial liabilities at amortized cost;

* Financial Guarantee Contracts;

Financial Liabilities at fair value through profit or loss

Financial Liabilities at fair value through profit or loss include financial liabilities held for trading and financial liabilities designated upon initial recognition as at fair value through the Statement of Profit and Loss. Financial Liabilities are classified as held for trading if they are incurred for the purpose of repurchasing in the near term. This category also includes derivative financial instruments entered into by the Company that are not designated as hedging instruments in hedge relationships as defined by Ind AS 109.

Gains or losses on liabilities held for trading are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Financial Liabilities at amortized cost

Financial Liabilities that are not held-for-trading and are not designated as at FVTPL are measured at amortized cost at the end of subsequent accounting periods. The carrying amounts of financial liabilities that are subsequently measured at amortized cost are determined based on the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss when the liabilities are derecognized as well as through the EIR amortization process.

Amortized cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or cost that are an integral part of the EIR. The EIR amortization is included as finance costs in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Financial Guarantee Contracts

Financial guarantee contracts issued by the Company are those contracts that require a payment to be made to reimburse the holder for a loss it incurs because the specified debtor fails to make the payment when due in accordance with the terms of a debt instrument. Financial guarantee contracts are recognized initially as a liability at fair value, adjusted for transaction costs that are directly attributable to the issuance of the guarantee. Subsequently, the liability is measured at the higher of the amount of loss allowance determined as per impairment requirements of Ind AS 109 and the amount initially recognized less cumulative income recognized in accordance with principles of Ind AS 115.

De-recognition of Financial Instruments

A financial asset is de-recognized when:

* The rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired, or

* the Company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, or the Company has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

A financial liability or a part of financial liability is de-recognized from the Balance Sheet when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expired. When an existing financial liability is replaced by another from the same lender on substantially different terms, or the terms of an existing liability are substantially modified, such an exchange or modification is treated as the de-recognition of the original liability and the recognition of a new liability. The difference in the respective carrying amounts is recognized in the statement of profit or loss.

Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount is reported in financial statements if there is a currently enforceable legal right to offset the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis, to realize the assets and settle the liabilities simultaneously.

Derivative instruments and hedge accounting:

The Company uses derivative financial instruments, such as forward currency contracts, to hedge its foreign currency risks respectively. Such derivative financial instruments are initially recognized at fair value on the date on which a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently re-measured at fair value. The accounting for subsequent changes in fair value of derivatives depends on the designation or non- designation of derivative as hedging instruments. Derivatives are carried as financial assets when the fair value is positive and as financial liabilities when the fair value is negative.

Derivative that are designated as Hedge Instrument

The Company undertakes foreign exchange forward contracts for hedging foreign currency risks. The Company generally designates the whole forward contract as hedging instrument.

These hedging instruments are governed by the Company's foreign exchange risk management policy approved by the Board of Directors.

At the inception of a hedge relationship, the Company formally designates and documents the hedge relationship to which the Company wishes to apply hedge accounting and the risk management objective and strategy for undertaking the hedge. The documentation includes the Company's risk management objective and strategy for undertaking hedge, the hedging/ economic relationship, the hedged item or transaction, the nature of the risk being hedged, hedge ratio and how the entity will assess the effectiveness of changes in the hedging instrument's fair value in offsetting the exposure to changes in the hedged item's fair value or cash flows attributable to the hedged risk.

Such hedges are expected to be highly effective in achieving offsetting changes in fair value or cash flows and are assessed on an ongoing basis to determine that the hedge is actually have been highly effective throughout the financial reporting periods for which it was designated

The effective portion of change in the fair value of the designated hedging instrument is recognized in the Other Comprehensive Income ('OCI') and accumulated under the heading Cash Flow Hedge Reserve within Equity. The gain or loss relating to the ineffective portion is recognized immediately in the Statement of Profit and Loss and included in the Other Income or Other Expenses as Gain on Derivatives or Loss on Derivatives respectively.

Amounts previously recognized in OCI and accumulated in equity relating to effective portion are reclassified to Statement of Profit and Loss in the periods when the hedged item affects profit or loss, in the same line item as the recognized hedged item or treated as basis adjustment if a hedged forecast transaction subsequently results in the recognition of a non-financial asset or non-financial liability. When a forecasted transaction is no longer expected to occur, the cumulative gain or loss accumulated in equity is transferred to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Hedge accounting is discontinued when the hedging instrument expires or is sold, terminated or exercised without replacement or rollover (as part of hedging strategy), or if its designation as a hedge is revoked, or when the hedge no longer meets the criteria for hedge accounting.

Contract Assets

Where the Company performs by transferring goods or services to a customer before the customer pays

consideration or before payment is due, the Company presents the contract as a contract asset. A contract asset is Company's right to consideration in exchange for goods or services that the Company has transferred to a customer, when that right is conditioned on something other than the passage of time. Contract assets are reviewed for impairment in accordance with Ind AS 109.

Contract Liabilities

Where the Company receives consideration, or the Company has a right to an amount of consideration that is unconditional (ie a receivable), before the Company transfers a good or service to the customer, the Company presents the contract as a contract liability when the payment is made or the payment is due (whichever is earlier). A contract liability is Company's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer for which the Company has received consideration (or an amount of consideration is due) from the customer.

Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent assets

Provisions

A provision is recognized if, as a result of a past event, the Company has a present legal obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation.

Provisions (excluding retirement benefits and compensated leave) are not discounted to its present value and are determined by the best estimate of the outflow of economic benefits required to settle the obligation at the reporting date. These are reviewed at each reporting date adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

Warranty obligations included in this type of provisions are not treated as a separate performance obligation, unless the customer has the option of contracting the warranty separately, therefore they are recognized in accordance with Ind AS 37. These provisions are classified as current liabilities since they relate to the operating construction projects cycle, in line with Ind AS 1.

Provision towards guarantee claims in respect of ships delivered wherever provided/ maintained is based on technical estimation. For the ships delivered, guarantee claims are covered by way of insurance policies covering the guarantee period on case-to-case basis, wherever required.

Provisions for anticipated losses are recognized when it becomes apparent that the total costs expected to fulfil a contract exceed expected contract revenues. For the

purpose of determining, where appropriate, the amount of the provision, budgeted contract revenue will include the forecast revenue that is considered probable, in line with Ind AS 37 as well as incremental costs. General costs are not directly attributable to a contract and are therefore excluded from the Budgeted cost unless they are explicitly passed on to the counterparty in accordance with the contract, in line with paragraph 68 of Ind AS 37.

Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

In the normal course of business, contingent liabilities may arise from litigations and other claims against the Company. Where the potential liabilities have a low probability of crystallizing or are very difficult to quantify reliably, the Company treats them as contingent liabilities. Such liabilities are disclosed in the notes but are not provided for in the financial statements. Although there can be no assurance regarding the final outcome of the legal proceedings, Company does not expect them to have a materially adverse impact on our financial position or profitability. The Company does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events and whose existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events not wholly within the control of the entity. The Company does not recognize a contingent asset but discloses its existence in the financial statements where an inflow of economic benefits is probable.

Revenue Recognition

a) Revenue from Operations

Revenue from contracts with customers are measured based on the consideration specified in a contract with a customer (ie., transaction price, which is the fair value of consideration received or receivable)

At the first instance, revenue recognition process involves identifying the relevant contracts and technical evaluation of the performance obligations, contained therein.

A single performance obligation is identified in shipbuilding and/or ship repair segments for each vessel, due to the high degree of integration and customization of the various goods and services forming a combined output that is transferred to the customer over time.

The company chooses the appropriate method of measuring the progress of the completion at the contract inception for recognizing revenue over time, and are applied consistently to similar performance obligations under the respective segments and/or activities carried out thereon.

Recognition of Revenue for a performance obligation satisfied over time is made only if the company can reasonably measure its progress towards complete satisfaction of the performance obligation

The performance obligations for the shipbuilding and Ship repair activities carried out by the company are satisfied over time rather than at a point in time, since the Company's performance does not create an asset with an alternative use to the Company and it has an enforceable right to payment for performance completed to date;

Revenue is recognized when the company satisfies performance obligations by transferring promised goods and services to the customer over a period of time using output method based on measurement of physical performance completed to date in respect of contracts with customers for ship building and ship repair.

In the case of ship repair contracts involving continuous maintenance support/ recurring and routine services, the company opted for time-elapsed output method, i.e, measuring the progress based on time elapsed to reporting date, which is representative of the satisfaction of performance obligation subject to entitlement of consideration in exchange of goods and/or services.

Based on the technical assessment considering the latest available information to the company, measuring the progress towards complete satisfaction of a performance obligation in the method adopted will be revised/updated on an ongoing basis.

During the initial stages of a contract, where the company may not be able to reasonably measure the outcome of a performance obligation and the company expects to recover the costs incurred in satisfying the performance obligation, revenue will be recognized only to the extent of the costs incurred until such time that it can reasonably measure the outcome of the performance obligation."

Contract modifications are accounted when additions, deletions or changes are approved either to the contract scope or contract price. The accounting for modifications of contracts involves assessing whether the services added to an existing contract are distinct and whether the pricing is at the stand alone selling price. Where the goods or services added are not distinct, adjustment to revenue is made on a cumulative catch up basis. Where the goods or services added are distinct, and such additional goods or services are priced at standalone selling prices, the contract modification is accounted for as a separate contract; whereas if the modification is not priced at standalone selling price, the same is accounted as a termination of the existing contract and creation of a new contract.

The Company generally does not recognize any revenue from additional work until it has been approved by the customer. When the scope of work has been approved but the impact on revenue is yet to be valued, the “variable consideration” requirement (as explained below) will apply. This entails recognizing revenue in an amount that is unlikely to be reversed.

If the consideration promised in a contract includes variable amounts like discounts, rebates, refunds, credits, price concessions, liquidated damages or other similar items, the Company estimates the net amount of consideration to which the Company is entitled in exchange for transferring the promised goods or services to a customer and accounts for the same. The payment terms are based on milestones specified in the respective contracts with customers. On achieving the specified milestones these payments are released.

Unlike revenue recognition, amounts billed to the customer are based on the various milestones reached under the contract and on acknowledgement thereof by the customer by means of a contractual document referred to as a progress billing certificate. Therefore, the amounts recognized as revenue for a given year do not necessarily match those billed to or certified by the customer. For contracts in which the revenue recognized exceeds the amount billed or certified, the difference is recognized in as “Contract Asset” under “Other Current Assets”, while for contracts in which the revenue recognized is lower than the amount billed or certified, the difference

is recognized as “Contract Liability” under “Other Current Liabilities”.

Other Operating Revenue with respective sale of stock items and scrap is recognized at the point of time when the company satisfies performance obligations and right to receive the income is established as per terms of the contract by transferring promised goods and services to the customer.

Ship Building Financial Assistance (SBFA) is recognized over a period of time in respect of orders recognised under SBFA policy when the management can reliably measure the probable receipt of the same.

The Company has changed the Revenue Recognition Accounting Policy under Ind As 115 from Input method to Output method in FY 2023-24

Company is recognising Revenue of Management Fees/Agency Fees on the basis of % of Financial Cost completion.

b) Government Grants

Government grants are recognized when there is reasonable assurance that the Company will comply with the conditions attaching to them and that the grants will be received.

Government grants are recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss on a systematic basis over the periods in which the Company recognizes as expenses, the related costs for which the grants are intended to compensate. Where the Grant relates to an asset value, it is recognized as deferred income, and amortized over the expected useful life of the asset. Other grants are recognized in the statement of Profit & Loss concurrent to the expenses to which such grants relate/ are intended to cover.

Government grants that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the Company with no future related costs are recognized in statement of profit & loss in the period in which they become receivable.

b) Other income

i) Liquidated damages and interest on advances and Sale of Scrap.

No income is recognized on (a) interest on advances given and (b) liquidated damages,

where the levies depend on decisions regarding force majeure condition of contract. These are accounted for on completion of contracts and / or when final decisions are taken. The sale of scrap is considered under Other Income.

In the case of contracts entered into for execution of capital works having long gestation period, where the extant commercial terms of the contract provides for provision of extending interest bearing mobilisation advance to the service provider for mobilising various resources for timely execution, mobilisation advances are paid and interest is accounted on accrual basis.

ii) Accounting for insurance claims

(i) Warranty/Builder Risk claims

In the case of guarantee defects covered under warranty insurance policies or claims under Insurance Policies taken for ship building and ship repair works, the insurance claims lodged are recognized in the financial statements in the year in which the survey is completed and the probable amount of settlement intimated by the insurance Company.

(ii) Other Insurance Policies

In the case of other Insurance Policies like Asset Insurance, Transit Insurance, Marine Insurance, Cash Insurance etc., the claims are recognized in the the financial statements on settlement of the claims by way of receipt of the amount from the Insurance Company.

In the case of Medical insurance, claims are recognized on due basis, based on the claims submitted with the insurance company."

Other items of income are accounted as and when the right to receive such income arises and it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the amount of income can be measured reliably.

Employee benefits

Employee benefits consist of salaries and wages, contribution to provident fund, superannuation fund, gratuity fund, towards medical assistance, which are short

term in nature and contribution towards compensated absences, which is long term in nature.

Post-employment benefit plans

Defined benefit plans

Gratuity

The Company provides for gratuity, a defined benefit retirement plan covering eligible employees. The liability or asset recognised in the balance sheet in respect of its defined benefit plan is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the end of the reporting period less the fair value of plan assets. The defined benefit obligation is calculated periodically by actuaries using the projected unit credit method.

The present value of the said obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows, using market yields of government bonds that have terms approximating the terms of the related liability.

The interest income / (expense) are calculated by applying the discount rate to the net defined benefit liability or asset. The net interest income / (expense) on the net defined benefit liability or asset is recognised in the Statement of Profit and loss.

Remeasurement gains and losses arising from experience adjustments and changes in actuarial assumptions are recognised in the period in which they occur, directly in other comprehensive income. They are included in retained earnings in the Statement of Changes in Equity and in the Balance Sheet.

Changes in the present value of the defined benefit obligation resulting from plan amendments or curtailments are recognised immediately in Statement of profit and loss as past service cost.

Provident Fund and Pension Scheme

The Company also makes contribution towards provident fund. Contributions to provident fund (a defined contribution plan) are made to the Regional Provident Fund Commissioner and are charged to the profit and loss account. The Company has no further obligations for future provident fund benefits other than its monthly contributions.

Other employee benefits

Compensated absences

The Company has a policy on compensated absence which are both accumulating and non-accumulating in nature. The expected cost of accumulating compensated

absence is determined by Actuarial valuation performed by an independent actuary at each Balance Sheet date using projected unit credit method on the additional amount expected to be paid/availed as a result of unused entitlement that has accumulated at the Balance Sheet date. Expense on non-accumulating compensated absence is recognised in the period in which the absences occur.

Taxes on Income

Income tax

Income tax expense comprises current tax expense and the net change in the deferred tax asset or liability during the year.

Current and deferred taxes are recognized in Statement of Profit and Loss, except when they relate to items that are recognized in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred tax are also recognized in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

The Company has determined that interest and penalties related to income taxes, including uncertain tax treatments, do not meet the definition of income taxes, and therefore accounted for them under Ind AS 37 Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets.

Current tax

Current tax is measured at the amount of tax expected to be payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years as determined in accordance with the provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961. The amount of current tax payable or receivable is the best estimate of the tax amount expected to be paid or received that reflects uncertainty related to income taxes, if any. It is measured using the tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Current tax assets and current tax liabilities are offset, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts and there is an intention to settle the asset and the liability on a net basis.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognized using the Balance Sheet approach. Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are recognised for deductible and taxable temporary differences arising between the tax base of assets and liabilities and their carrying amount, except when the

deferred income tax arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss at the time of the transaction.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that either future taxable profits or reversal of deferred tax liabilities will be available, against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised.

The carrying amount of a deferred tax asset shall be reviewed at the end of each reporting date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred income tax asset to be utilised. Unrecognized deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognized to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax assets to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are off set when there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets and liabilities and when the deferred tax balances relate to the same taxation authority.

Operating Segments

Operating segments are defined as components of an enterprise for which discrete financial information is available that is evaluated regularly by the chief operating decision maker, in deciding how to allocate resources and assessing performance. The Company's chief operating decision maker is the Chairman & Managing Director.

The Company has identified business segments (industry practice) as reportable segments. The business segments comprise: 1) Ship Building and 2) Repair of Ships/offshore structures.

Segment revenue, segment expenses, segment assets and segment liabilities have been identified to segments on the basis of their relationship to the operating activities of the segment. Revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities which relate to the Company as a whole and are not allocable to segments on a reasonable basis have been included under "unallocated revenue / expenses / assets / liabilities".

Description of Plans:

The Company has not taken any funded plan for gratuity of its employees. The present value of obligation is determined in accordance with the advice of independent, Professionally qualified actuaries using the projected unit credit method, which is recognised in each period of service as giving rise to additional unit of employee benefit entitlement and measures each unit separately to build up the final obligation. Risk:

The Defined Benefit Plans expose the Company to interest rate risk, salary cost inflation risk and Demographic risk.

Interest Rate Risk: The present value of Defined Benefit Plans liability is determined using the discount rate based on the market yields prevailing at the end of reporting period on Government bonds. A decrease in yields will increase the fund liabilities and vice-versa.

Salary Cost Inflation Risk: The present value of the Defined Benefit Plan liability is calculated with reference to the future salaries of participants under the Plan. Increase in salary might lead to higher liabilities.

Demographic risk : This is the risk of variability of results due to unsystematic nature of decrements that include mortality, withdrawal, disability and retirement. The effect of these decrements on the defined benefit obligation is not straight forward and depends upon the combination of salary increase, discount rate and vesting criteria. It is important not to overstate withdrawals because in the financial analysis the retirement benefit of a short career employee typically costs less per year as compared to a long service employee.
